Gratulujemy osiągniętych wyników w etapie rejonowym.

Przed przystąpieniem do rozwiązywania testu prosimy, żebyś zapoznał się z poniższymi wskazówkami:

1. zakoduj swoje dane na karcie odpowiedzi do zadań zamkniętych i wpisz swój kod na karcie odpowiedzi do zadań otwartych zgodnie z poleceniem komisji konkursowej;

2. masz do rozwiązania 50 zadań i wypowiedź pisemną, w tym:

a) zadania 1 - 33 to zadania zamknięte, gdzie podane są 3 - 6 odpowiedzi, z których tylko jedna jest poprawna.

Why don't Facebook and Apple like each other?

Big corporate rivalries - Coca-Cola and Pepsi, Boeing and Airbus, McDonald's and Burger King - tend to have one thing in common: competition for the same business.

That's why Facebook and Apple's feud is so intriguing. They're both big technology companies, 1._____. Almost all of Facebook's revenue is from advertising but it provides only a small fraction of Apple's, which comes mostly from devices and its App Store.

The two companies don't really compete with each other - they just don't like each other. For years, Apple's Tim Cook has said 2._____ - to make money from advertising - and plays fast and loose with their privacy. Mark Zuckerberg, meanwhile, says Apple's products are expensive and it has ulterior motives for criticising Facebook.

Last year, according to the New York Times, Apple even cut off Facebook's developer tools. The latest chapter in the feud, last week, has made the situation even worse. Earlier this year, Apple announced it would introduce a feature called App Tracking Transparency, to give people more control over their data. Crucially, customers would have to opt in for their data - previously handed over by default - to be used by apps such as Facebook's. That is a massive problem for Facebook, 3._____. It says openly that this will damage its business.

As far back as 2010, Apple co-founder Steve Jobs reportedly warned Facebook about privacy. And in 2018, Mr Cook, Apple's current boss, said he could have followed Facebook by using data to sell ads 4. _____ .

Roger McNamee, a Silicon Valley investor and author of Zucked, a critical book about Facebook and its founder Mark Zuckerberg, is no fan of Facebook either. "Apple's culture is one of empowering its customers," he says, "Facebook's culture is exploiting its users. "Historically, Apple has had plenty of reasons to criticise other people and has chosen not to do so. "I think that's a tribute to how offensive they find Facebook's behaviour."

Travel Guide: 24 hours in Edinburgh

It might be the capital of Scotland, the home of vibrant festivals and the seat of Scottish power, but there's something about the cold cobbles, the wind-battered stones and the towering castle that make the hilly city of Edinburgh still feel like a haunted fortress atop an enchanted mountain.

Must Visit

Perched on an extinct volcano, Edinburgh Castle dominates the city's skyline and the 16th century building is Scotland's most popular tourist site. You'll have to book months in advance to see the famous Scottish Military Tattoo, and extravaganza of fireworks, pipes and dancing at the castle. But for a peek at the ordinary lives of citizens of Edinburgh, Real Mary King's Close is a hidden treat, just off the Royal Mile. Venture underground to a secret warren of hidden 17th century streets, led by a character from the period. See how residents suffered from the plague, wicked deals and murderous plots that took place in the shadowy close. The museum is a treat for children, fascinating for adults, and a warm and welcome respite if the Scottish heavens have opened.

Must Be Seen At

Edinburgh's hippest restaurants and bars are mostly in the New Town, close to Princes Street. But one exception is the swanky Ondine, an award-winning fish restaurant just a short skip from the Castle. The glass-fronted upstairs restaurant is perfect for people watching, while supping an Edinburgh Gin Daisy cocktail. Fresh, local and zingy fish dishes change regularly, but might include Ondine smoked salmon with homemade cucumber pickle, silky fish soup with gruyere croutons, or a moist and smoky grilled sea-bass.

Must Chill Out

One of the city's most up-and-coming districts, and home of the Royal Yacht Britannia is Leith, Edinburgh's port. On a sunny evening, young professionals and artists fill the quayside bars.

Must See The View

It's not for the faint-hearted, but a brisk stroll up dormant volcano Arthur's Seat will put hairs on your chest. The mini-mountain stands in the middle of Holyrood Park and is said to have been the mythical location of King Arthur's palace, Camelot. It's a sweaty 40-minute hike to the top, and you'll find yourself shedding the scarves and cagoules you wore while strolling round the city, but the views of the city and the sea from the top are breathtaking.
