Gdańsk is a dynamic business hub strategically located in northern Poland, on the Baltic Sea coast. As part of the Tricity metropolitan area, together with Gdynia and Sopot, it forms one of the country's most economically and culturally significant regions. The city is a key trade and logistics centre, offering access to international business opportunities through its modern port, road, rail, and air networks. The region is home to numerous business centres, international companies, universities, and innovation hubs, making it an attractive destination for conferences, trade fairs, and corporate events.

Getting to Gdańsk



The Gdańsk Lech Walesa Airport is one of Poland's most important and most modern international airports. It is located 16 kilometres from the centre of Gdansk. The historic Old Town is accessible either by bus or train service. The journey by public transport takes around 40 minutes.

The Airport offers around 90 air connections to European destinations, operated by several carriers like Eurowings, Finnair and KLM.

BY BUS/CAR

If you decide to arrive by car, you may use the A1 motorway (AmberOne) connecting the city with the international road transport corridors. Dual carriageways link Gdańsk with Warsaw and a number of Poland's other major cities.

The city is easily and directly accessible by an extensive railway network and long-distance domestic and international bus services, Gdańsk is a vital railway hub, with dozens of trains passing through each day. High-speed trains will get you to Gdańsk directly not just from all major Polish cities but also from Berlin and Prague.

Gdańsk's seaport and nearby Gdynia offer regular ferry connections to Sweden (Karlskrona & Nynäshamn). These services are an excellent option for business travelers from the Nordic region, combining comfort with seamless access to the city.
